- 1) General Water Navigation
 - a. Scullers technically must yield to sailboats. This might be challenging due to:
 - i. Scullers face backwards and might not see sailboats – give a shout of warning if possible
 - ii. In rough conditions, sculling boats are not as maneuverable as sail boats.
 - b. Passing boats must yield to boat being passed
 - c. Crossing paths – boats should cross to the stern of the boat (behind), do not speed up to try to pass in front.
 - d. Rules are in place for marine navigation, but use common sense and courtesy to avoid collisions at all costs
- 2) Avoidance
 - a. Scullers and sailors aren't likely to often be on the water together as scullers generally do not like wind, and sailors do.
 - b. It would be nice if sailors tried generally to avoid sculler's typical routes along the perimeter of the lake.
 - i. Scullers typically will travel in straight lines with gradual turns at corners
 - c. It would be nice if scullers tried to generally avoid sailor's typical "routes" in the middle of the lake.
 - d. Scullers will generally all go the same direction, either clockwise or counterclockwise on any given day.
- 3) Docks: When sculling shells are on the water, sailors should not use the sculling docks unless particularly convenient and necessary.
 - a. Do not leave sailboats unattended at the sculling dock.
 - b. Scullers should remove the oars and equipment from the dock as soon as possible after landing to share the dock resource.
